

Faculty from New American Colleges and Universities Receive Prestigious Fulbright Awards

Faculty from the six following New American Colleges and Universities received Fulbright Awards: Pacific Lutheran University, University of Evansville, Drake University, Samford University, Quinnipiac University, and Elon University.

From **Pacific Lutheran University**, Joanne Lisosky, associate professor of communication, received a Fulbright Award beginning in January 2011 in Azerbaijan to teach journalism at Baku University. Janet Weiss, assistant professor of instructional development and leadership, received a Fulbright-Hays Award to do curriculum work in Namibia during July. Jennifer Jenkins, assistant professor of German, was selected to participate during the summer of 2010 in the Baden-Württemberg Seminar for American Faculty in German and German Studies, funded by the German American Fulbright Commission and the Ministry of Science, Research and the Arts of Baden- Württemberg.
